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

A CALL TO CONVERSION: THE FIRE THAT TRANSFORMS

Dear Parishioners of St. John Vianney,

Lent is a sacred time when God invites us to turn back to Him, to be renewed, and to bear good fruit in our lives. This Sunday's readings challenge us to take a deep and honest look at our spiritual journey. They remind us that conversion is not just a moment but a lifelong process that requires vigilance, humility, and trust in God's mercy.

1. The Burning Bush: A Call to Encounter God (Exodus 3:1-8a, 13-15)

In the First Reading, we see Moses encountering God in the burning bush; a fire that burns but does not consume. This is not just a dramatic moment in history; it is a symbol of how God's presence transforms us without destroying us. God reveals His sacred name: "I AM WHO I AM," showing that He is eternal, faithful, and ever-present in our lives.

Like Moses, we often feel unworthy or hesitant before God's call. But God does not choose the perfect; He perfects those He chooses. The fire of His love refines us, burning away fear, doubt, and sin. This Lent, are we attentive to God's presence in our lives? Are we allowing His love to refine us, or are we avoiding His call?

2. Learning from the Past: Warnings from Israel's Journey

(1 Corinthians 10:1-6, 10-12)

St. Paul reminds us that the Israelites, though they witnessed great miracles, still fell into sin through ingratitude, idolatry, and complaining. Paul warns us: "So if you think you are standing, watch out that you do not fall" (1 Corinthians 10:12). This is a sobering message: spiritual pride can be our downfall.

Lent is a time to examine our own hearts. Are we presuming upon God's mercy while remaining unchanged? Do we grumble instead of giving thanks? Do we take our faith for granted? The spiritual life is not automatic; it requires ongoing effort. The good news is that God's grace is always available to help us stand firm.

3. The Barren Fig Tree: A Call to Bear Fruit (Luke 13:1-9)

In the Gospel, Jesus tells a parable of a fig tree that has not borne fruit for three years. The owner wants to cut it down, but the gardener pleads for one more year, one more chance for it to bear fruit.

This parable speaks directly to us. God is patient, but He also expects transformation. We cannot keep delaying conversion. As St. Augustine famously said, "God has promised forgiveness to your repentance, but He has not promised tomorrow to your procrastination."

Lent is our "one more year." It is a season of grace, a time to cultivate the soil of our hearts with prayer, fasting, and charity. Are we bearing the fruits of love, mercy, and generosity? Or are we spiritually stagnant? Jesus calls us to take our faith seriously, to nurture it so that it grows and bears fruit in our families, workplaces, and communities.

Bringing It Home: A Personal Invitation

This week, let us reflect on three simple yet profound questions:

- **1.** Where is God trying to get my attention, like He did with Moses?
- **2.** What areas of my life need purification and renewal?
- 3. Am I bearing fruit, or am I delaying my conversion?

The good news is that God is patient, merciful, and ever ready to nourish us. But we must respond. As St. Catherine of Siena reminds us: "Be who God meant you to be, and you will set the world on fire."

Let this Lent be a time of true renewal. Let us not delay our response to God's call. He is ready to transform us; are we ready to say yes?


