# HOSPITALITY OF THE HEART: WELCOMING CHRIST IN OUR MIDST

This Sunday's readings invite us into one of the most tender and transformative aspects of the Christian life: hospitality, not merely of the home, but of the heart. As we gather on this 16th Sunday in Ordinary Time, Year C, the Word of God opens a window into the divine mystery of encountering Christ through presence, attentiveness, and loving service.

#### Abraham's Tent: A Model of Sacred Hospitality

In our First Reading from Genesis 18:1–10, Abraham receives three mysterious visitors under the oak of Mamre. He hurries to welcome them, offers food and rest, and listens to them. In doing so, he unknowingly entertains God Himself. This scene is a profound biblical witness to what the Letter to the Hebrews later affirms: "Do not neglect to show hospitality to strangers, for by doing that some have entertained angels without knowing it" (Hebrews 13:2).

The Church Fathers saw in this event a foreshadowing of the Trinitarian God. St. Ambrose wrote that "Abraham saw three, but adored one", discerning in the visitation a glimpse of the divine communion.

This is not just about generosity, it's about receptivity. Abraham's tent becomes a sanctuary. His welcome opens the way for God to reveal a promise: the birth of Isaac, the son of hope.

#### Martha and Mary: Two Sisters, One Lord, One Lesson

In Luke 10:38–42, we meet Martha and Mary, two sisters who each respond to Jesus' visit in different ways. Martha is busy with the duties of hospitality, while Mary sits at the feet of the Lord, listening. When Martha expresses frustration, Jesus gently affirms Mary's choice: "Mary has chosen the better part, which will not be taken away from her."

This Gospel does not dismiss service, but it reorders our priorities. Jesus does not criticize Martha's work, but her anxiety and distraction. True hospitality is not just about doing, it is about being present. St. Augustine beautifully comments, "Martha was busy serving One who needed nothing... Mary chose to be filled at the table of the Word."

How often do we allow our busyness, even in service, to crowd out the Lord's presence? In our over-scheduled lives, this Gospel is a gentle call to re-center ourselves, to sit at Jesus' feet, to listen, to be present.

### The Mind of Christ: A Theological Insight

The Second Reading from Colossians 1:24–28 offers a key that binds these themes. St. Paul speaks of the mystery that has been hidden for ages: "Christ in you, the hope of glory." This is the mystery that Mary perceived at Jesus' feet and that Abraham sensed beneath the oaks of Mamre.

Karl Rahner, one of the greatest theologians of the 20th century, wrote: "The Christian of the future will be a mystic or will not exist at all." Hospitality of the heart is ultimately a mystical disposition; it is making space for the Divine Other within us and among us.

The Catechism of the Catholic Church teaches, "Contemplation is a gaze of faith, fixed on Jesus... It is hearing the Word of God, an attitude of silent love" (CCC 2715). Mary's example, in her stillness and attentive love, is contemplative hospitality, an interior openness to God.

#### Living the Word: From the Sanctuary to the Sidewalk

What does this mean for us today? In a world that values efficiency over encounter, performance over presence, and speed over silence, we are invited to become islands of holy attentiveness.

- In our homes, how often do we offer the kind of listening that heals, rather than advice that fixes?
- In our parish, can we be like Abraham, quick to welcome the stranger, the lonely, the seeker?
- In our hearts, can we be like Mary, making time each day to sit with the Lord in prayer, even amidst the many "Marthas" we carry inside?

The poet Rainer Maria Rilke once wrote, "The only journey is the one within." This Sunday, Christ journeys not only into the house of Martha and Mary, but into your heart and mine, asking gently, "Will you make room for Me, not only in service, but in stillness?"

Hospitality is not primarily about how we open our homes; it is about how we open our hearts. To God. To others. To the stillness where God speaks. As St. Benedict famously instructed in his Rule, "Let all guests be received as Christ." For indeed, every guest, every moment of prayer, every person in need is Christ Himself.

# Let us not allow our lives to be too full to welcome the One who alone can fill us.
