

"THE TRUE WEALTH: FINDING LIFE BEYOND MATERIAL ABUNDANCE"

As we gather this Sunday, the Church invites us to reflect deeply on a profound truth found in the Scriptures for the 18th Sunday in Ordinary Time (Year C). Our readings, drawn from Ecclesiastes, Psalm 90, Colossians, and the Gospel of Luke, challenge the very way we measure wealth, success, and life's true purpose.

The Illusion of Earthly Riches

The First Reading from Ecclesiastes starkly reminds us: "Vanity of vanities, all is vanity." (Ecclesiastes 1:2) The preacher laments the futility of human toil when focused solely on accumulating wealth. This theme reverberates in today's Gospel where Jesus tells the parable of the rich man who hoards abundant grain, building bigger barns to store his goods, only to die suddenly and lose everything.

This man's story is not merely about financial riches but about a mindset—anchoring one's security and identity in possessions, forgetting that "one's life does not consist in the abundance of possessions" (Luke 12:15). The rich man's tragic end invites us to reconsider what we truly value and to whom our life belongs.

A Call to Spiritual Wisdom and Generosity

The Church teaches us, through the Catechism (CCC 2544), that "the goods of creation are destined for the whole human race." We are stewards, not owners, called to use earthly resources wisely and generously. Saint Augustine wisely said, "God is more truly our own than we ourselves." Our identity and security rest not in wealth but in God's providence and love.

St. Paul, in his letter to the Colossians, exhorts believers to "set your minds on things that are above, not on things that are on earth" (Colossians 3:2). This does not mean ignoring our earthly needs but prioritizing eternal values—charity, justice, humility, and trust in God.

Living in Today's World: A Human Scenario

Consider the story of Maria, a single mother who works tirelessly to provide for her children. She faces daily struggles yet finds joy in simple acts of kindness—sharing meals with neighbors, volunteering at church, and nurturing her children's faith. Though materially modest, Maria's life overflows with meaning and peace.

In contrast, some might amass wealth but suffer loneliness and anxiety, never experiencing the deep satisfaction that comes from generous living. Jesus' parable challenges us to choose Maria's way—rich in what truly matters.

Spiritual Takeaway

This Sunday, the Lord calls us to "be rich toward God" (Luke 12:21). Let us examine our attachments and ask: Are we storing up treasures for ourselves, or investing in eternal riches through love, mercy, and service? True life is found not in hoarding but in sharing, not in anxiety over tomorrow but in faithfulness today.

As Pope Francis reminded us, "God's love is gratuitous; it is not bought or earned." When we open our hearts and hands to others, we embrace the true wealth that lasts forever.

In Conclusion

The 18th Sunday in Ordinary Time offers a powerful spiritual mirror reflecting our priorities. Let us heed Jesus' warning and wisdom, living as generous stewards of God's gifts, trusting that our ultimate treasure lies not in possessions but in our relationship with God and neighbor.

May St. John Vianney Parish community grow in grace and charity, becoming a beacon of hope and true richness in Christ.

During this **Jubilee Year of Hope**, the Church calls us to become living signs of mercy in a world in need of healing. **The Corporal Works of Mercy** are tangible ways to respond to this call, offering hope through compassionate action. Rooted in Christ's words in *Matthew 25:35–40*, these works call us to see and serve Jesus in those most in need:

"For I was hungry and you gave me food, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink...

sick and you took care of me, in prison and you visited me... just as you did it to one of the least of these... you did it to me."

The Corporal Works of Mercy include:

- Feed the hungry -by sharing food or supporting food banks and community meals (St. Vincent de Paul)
- Give drink to the thirsty -by providing clean water or advocating for those without access.
- Clothe the naked -by donating clothing or supporting shelters..
- Shelter the homeless -by offering hospitality or contributing to housing efforts.
- Visit the sick -by offering time, prayers, and comfort to the ill and suffering.
- Visit the imprisoned -by reaching out with dignity and mercy to those who are incarcerated.
- Bury the dead -by showing respect for life by attending funerals and supporting the grieving.

In each of these acts, we encounter Christ and become instruments of His mercy. As *Pilgrims of Hope*, let us renew our commitment to serve others with love. Even the smallest act of kindness can bring light into dark places and reveal the nearness of God's healing grace in this Holy Year.


